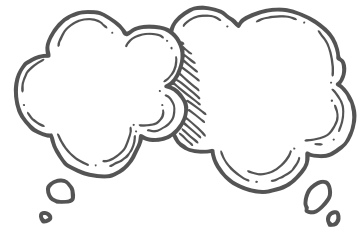

Memorialising... Children in the mines

Working in a coal mine is well known for being dangerous. But did you know, for many years, it wasn't just adults facing the dangers? Children worked in mines too!

EXPLORE

Explore this coal miner's pick from Brora – it has an especially short handle because space was so tight in the mine. Miners often had to lay on their backs to mine the coal above them – you wouldn't want to do that job if you were claustrophobic!

TALK ABOUT IT

We now understand better that we need to protect children and keep them safe. The Mines and Collieries Act of 1842 stopped children under the age of 10 from working underground. This was changed to include children under the age of 12 in 1860.

TALK ABOUT IT

Children from poorer families had very different childhoods from today! They were often sent to work instead of having time to play and have fun.

Have a look at the Codd bottle on the website – these bottles were very common in the late-Victorian period and brilliant for storing drinks. However, they are nearly always found with broken necks. That's because little boys broke the bottles to try and get out the marble that was inside each one!

It reminds us how children from poorer families had very few toys!

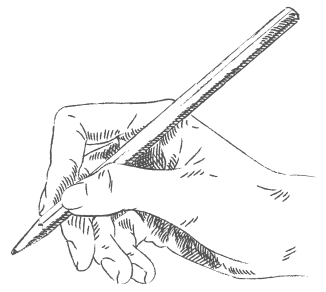
